CSUDH granted departmentalization status to Chicana/o Studies in 1994. The programs interdisciplinary nature, relied on courses offered through Spanish, History, Psychology, Art, Sociology, Anthropology and Teacher Education, thus it differed from programs at CSULA, CSUN, and CSULB. Moreover, the Chicana/o Studies curriculum leaned toward the Humanities rather than the Social Sciences. The founding director of Mexican American Studies, Dr. Porfirio Sánchez, held a full-time position within the Foreign Languages Department. Similarly the founding chair of the Chicana/o Studies Department, Dr. Miguel Domínguez also held a position in the Spanish Department. In the early 1990s, the Chicana/o Studies Department moved toward developing and offering more "in house" courses. The number of units in the major and minor has grown to 39 and 18 respectively. Additionally, the department offers 7 graduate-level courses... The CHS department at CSUDH plans to expand its students and faculty base while revising the curriculum to reflect news trends in scholarship and student interest. It will continue its partnership with Africana Studies, Asian-Pacific Studies and Women's Studies to finds ways of reaching cross-cultural audiences. The department intends to continue and expand its community partnerships by making the Young Scholars Program available to AB540 students who only pay \$3.50 per course regardless of their citizenship status. Moreover, it will continue to offer college-level courses to Anahuacalmecac International University Preparatory High School of North America." (Irene Vasquez)

It developed the Department of Mexican American Studies, educating students about the relationship between culture, politics, economics and the dynamic between the US and Mexican border region. Founding members include Rene Nuñez, Gus Segade, Juan Gómez-Quiñones, Jorge González, and Alurista, there of who were also participants in the writing of *El Plan de Santa Barbara*. In 1996 the department changed its name to the Department of Chicana and Chicano Studies. In 2008, with the assistance of SDSU's Office of International Programs, CCS offered its first Study Abroad course at the CETYS in Tijuana, Baja California, Mexico and has offered the course every semester since then. In 2005, in response to recommendations resulting from a 2000 annual review, the program implemented a master's program in Chicana/o transnational studies with specializations in Gender and Borderland Studies. It is the only master's program in Chicana/o south of Los Angeles and presently the only CCS master's program with an emphasis on transnational studies."

Description: "The department grew out of sponsorship for Student Services support (through the Department of Sociology, 1970); courses and instructors were taught through a department; for example, 'La Chicana' was taught in the 1970s, as was "Introduction to Chicano Studies," which fulfilled a social science requirement. Before the unit achieved departmental status, many of southern California's leaders in Chicano studies taught at LMU. When Professor Fernando Guerra arrived in 1984 (as an ABD, University of Michigan, Political Science Department), he assumed leadership duties; the first chair was Sister Teresita Vanegas and she was succeeded by Dr. Guerra, who then, although an assistant professor in Political Science with joint appointment in Chicano Studies, chaired the department and taught its introductory course for 15 years. In 1996, Professor Graciela Limon assumed the chairship, having achieved her seniority in the Department of Modern Languages. She added her years of experience in administrative work and as a seasoned faculty member to the stability that Professor Guerra and Professor Vanegas had previously established. She was able to add one full-time tenure track line to the department in late 1990s. This effort added historian Gabriel Gutierrez to the department. In 2001, Professor Deena J. González was hired to chair the department (Professor Limon retired the previous year), and by then the department included Professor Guerra as well as Professor Karen Mary Davalos (assistant professor; promoted to associate professor with tenure in fall, 2004). Professor Davalos is now chair of the department (May 2009) ...LMU boasts between 19-21% Latino/a student body in any given semester; we serve all through our curriculum/courses in the Core Curriculum (undergraduate general education) as well as through our major and minor. We enroll an average of 240+ students per year in our own courses and we also teach several courses in American Cultures Studies, which we support through the curriculum and in our programming. In the dept, over 70% of the students enrolled in our courses are Latino."

The proposal was resubmitted the following year and approved. Dr. Jorge Mariscal wrote the original proposal and the revised proposal and became director of the minor program."

The program developed a minor in 1996. After a period of initial growth, Chicano Studies reached a stasis with enrollments totaling only 185. With the new name for the program, enrollments are rapidly climbing as students take the following courses and engage in the following activities: Indo-Hispano Traditional Arts, Border Culture, the Camino Real, a Senior Service Learning Colloquium, and Documentation of Traditional Cultures summer field work class. There are interesting International Projects, Museum Projects, Smithsonian Exhibitions, National Conferences, Cultural Festivals and much collaboration with community groups.

Stephanie Alvarez (Modern Languages and Literature) and Sonia Hernandez (History & Philosophy) began meeting to revise the curriculum for the Mexican American Heritage Program major and minor. Drs. Jennifer Mata (History & Philosophy) and Edna Ochoa (Modern Languages and Literature) and Emmy Perez (English) then joined this effort to revitalize this important area of study in the Fall of 2009; Dr. Marci McMahon (English) joined the committee in the spring of 2009. The committee submitted the newly revised interdisciplinary degree plan to the University Curriculum Committee and received approval in late Spring of 2009. This group of faculty has also been successful in aligning the major and minor to South Texas College's Associate Degree in Mexican American Studies. The group has also been pro-active in compiling a list of all UTPA courses related to the Mexican American and Latina/o experience and plans to identify all faculty members with research and teaching expertise in this area in the hopes of creating faculty affiliates to MAS. The committee's efforts have been strengthened by the formal recognition as a Mexican American Studies Task Force appointed by Dr. Dahlia Guerra, Dean of the College of Arts and Humanities, in the Spring of 2009." 90 percent Latinos.

The Mex-Am Studies at PAC is multidisciplinary and doesn't come under any one department. Courses are offered in Intro to Mex-Am Studies, Mexican-American History I & II, Mex-Am Politics, Mex-Am Literature, Intermediate Spanish II and Spanish for Native Speakers II and Mex-Am Fine Arts Appreciation (this is a course that is sometimes rotated in music, drama and visual arts)... Mariana Scuros-Ornelas (Intro to Mex-Am Studies which is a Humanities course); Javier Aguirre taught the History courses (he has since moved to Northeast Lakeview College in our same district). This year we have R. Field teaching the History course. They have not designated yet someone to teach the Mex-Am Politics course we are offering in the Fall, 2009 semester. PAC is not offering any of the Spanish courses in the Fall 2009 semester. Also, our advisors were telling, and still but not as much, our students that MX AM History I&II do not count for US I&II only as an elective. This was problematic because we use these classes to advertise the MA Program. For what it’s worth: we have made the most sections of Mexican American History (I&II) in the Valley (in South Texas)... Between 17-20 classes affiliated with the program.” This is a very active program hosting the Tejas Foco of the National Association for Chicana/o Studies.

Participants at the conference came from Wisconsin, Iowa, South Dakota, Nebraska, Illinois, Kansas, Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio. That summer, the 180 conferees, including migrant field workers from Texas, made a unanimous decision that the new unit should study Mexicans in their struggle to settle in the Midwest. Under pressure from the Latin Liberation Front, a student-led group of Chicana and Chicano students from colleges in the Twin Cities, the University of

Minnesota began to address financial aid, campus employment for students, and recruiting. In particular, the Latin Liberation Front strongly encouraged the creation of a Department of Chicano Studies at the University of Minnesota. Dissatisfied with the pace of the University response, on October 26, 1971, twenty Chicano students occupied the Twin Cities administration building, Morrill Hall. Ramona Arreguin de Rosales of St. Paul, the first president of the Latin Liberation front has noted in an interview with University historian Ann Pflaum that the administration "didn't understand the Chicano identity." Following a two hour meeting with administration officials, Manuel Guzman, presented the group's demands: "If we do not have concrete evidence of the establishment or implementation of a Chicano Studies Department within 72 hours a vote will be taken to strike against the university administration and its policies." The next largest group (28) identified themselves as “Chicano”. “Spanish-American” was the third largest group (26). Nineteen students identified as “Mexican”. Sixteen people in the sample checked “another related term”. Latino (8), Central American (6) Puerto Rican (5) South American (5) and Cuban (2) represented the smallest groups.

The survey asked students their preference in program title. Seventy Five students selected the title “Hispanic Studies”. Fortunately the 28 students who selected Chicano Studies named the program.

It appears that a staff member, Dolores Cardona, was heavily involved in starting the program. The first Director, Antonio Bustamante was hired to initiate the program. This must have been around 1998/99. At the time, I believe there was no other Chicana/o/Latina/o identified faculty. When I arrived in 2002, there was an interim director. The current Director was hired in 2003. Currently there are 4-5 Chicana/o faculty on campus. Three of us were hired expressly to contribute courses to the program...

There are probably some superficial ties to the community. CHST maintains good relations with La Radio, an independent radio station. Also CHST has supported resurrecting a local community center situated on the West Side, the traditionally Chicano community (as in many Chicana/o Latina/o communities in WY, the west side is literally on the other side of the railroad tracks). The Chicano community, however, is small in WY. The census estimates “Hispanics” to be a little more than 6 percent of the population. However, I find that number suspect. I would argue that the population is at least three times that number. I think there is a tendency to check off the non-hispanic white box among the 2nd, 3rd and 4th generation. Of course, there is probably also undercounting of seasonal labor. What all this means is that the sights and sounds that make up traditional Chicana/o communities in our neighboring states are largely absent here.”
